DECLARACIÓN DE MISIÓN DE OLQP



JUST A THOUGHT...OR TWO...

Pope Francis has talked about the priests who walk around looking like they just came from a funeral... he asks, where is their joy? He seems to wonder about their inner life and their outer life.

Jesus' harsh words for his religious leaders are because he felt that they were frauds. They made, in perfect fashion, all the outward pious signs but the signs were empty for inside; they were mean and cruel men. They made life difficult for their followers and did nothing to help them.

In today's Gospel, Jesus is challenging his disciples not to become the pious frauds that he has called out some of the religious leaders to be. Just like the prophet Malachi in the first reading, Jesus calls out the hypocrisy of those who are supposed to be the leaders of the people and who are called to lead by example but do not.

And today it is no different. In the church and in our nation some leaders fail. I include myself in the group for I am far from sinless. We have priests and bishops who have covered up the sinful behavior of other priests and bishops and our political leaders, who claim to be people of faith, whose trade is fraud and whose goals are to mislead the people for personal gain. Our most senior politicians lie without hesitation and their

actions show they care nothing for the poor and most vulnerable of our sisters and brothers.

Jesus challenged the integrity of the religious leaders of his day, he challenged them to live up to the call they had received from God! Pope Francis has challenged us to do the same, and for that, some plot against him or ignore him, sure that their pious acts alone will save them.

But Pope Francis has heard the call of Jesus -- it is not the perfectly performed pious act that God desires of us, but rather LOVE! Lavish love for the immigrant, for refugees and for the poor and the abandoned, for the one who is "other" from me.

As I have asked many times, am I willing to open myself up to dangers by living as a disciple of Jesus Christ? Am I willing to risk being a disciple of Jesus Christ knowing what it led to for him and for some of his closest followers? Can I open my heart wide enough to allow myself to be the beloved of God and to live from that identity, and risk my life for God? What can I do so as to better let God transform my inner self so as to match my outer actions of charity and love?

In this light, we call attention to the *Book of Life* in our sanctuary. We invite anyone who has experienced a loss this past year to add the name of that person to our *Book of Life* at the end of Mass. This will be a continual reminder to us year round of those who have gone before us marked with the sign of the faith and the need to reach out to those who have suffered a recent loss.

NOW is an acceptable time...

Time is almost up — that is, for VOTING in one of the most crucial elections in Virginia. On *election day*, TUESDAY, November 7, the polls are open from 6:00am — 7:00pm. In case you forgot to register to vote, Virginia law permits same day registration. An officer of election at your polling location will assist you to register AND to vote. Check your status at https://vote.elections.virginia.gov/

Remember that all 140 General Assembly seats (100 State Delegates, 40 State Senators) will vacate on December 31. January 1 will mark a new year and a new beginning for the Commonwealth of Virginia. The 2024 General Assembly will open on January 10 with *many* new legislators. There were many retirements and resignations at the close of the 2023 General Assembly and a loss of incumbents in the primary election in June.

It is an important responsibility for Virginians to use their *vote* as a means of using their *voice*. Our VOTE is our VOICE! Just do it!!!

Voting in free and secure elections is a precious right!

NEWS FROM MEDOR

Medor's agro-forestry program includes an animal husbandry component. It is called the "Passing Gift Program" because farmers who care for the program's goats do not own the goats until they have passed two offspring to other farmers.

The Passing Gift Program began in 2015 with 15 goats. By July 2023 the program included 212 goats. Livestock in Medor is described as the family's bank account, as animals can be sold to cover expenses of tuition, funerals, and other necessities. Thank you for helping to support this wonderful program.



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White America has a selective memory of MLK's dream By <u>FATHER BRYAN MASSINGALE</u>, SJ

Martin Luther King Jr's landmark, "I Have A Dream" speech is a masterpiece of public religious discourse, yet its radical force is often diluted and suppressed. (U.S. Catholic.org, September 12, 2023)

Sixty years ago, on August 28, 1963, a young Black minister addressed what was the largest assembly of civil rights protesters in the nation's history. He recounted the country's legacy of broken promises over racial equality, which he described as checks returned marked "insufficient funds." He described the "great trials and tribulations" that so many had endured: harassment, beatings, and the horror of being crammed in dank, narrow jail cells for their convictions. Yet he implored them to continue their grinding, treacherous, and dangerous work for justice: "Go back to Mississippi, go back to Alabama, go back to South Carolina, go back to Georgia, go back to Louisiana, go back to the slums and ghettoes of our northern cities, knowing that somehow this situation can and will be changed." And then, at the urging of a gospel singer, Mahalia Jackson, he shared a dream: a litany of inspirational visions of what one day will be because of what they dared to do now. Martin Luther King Jr. dreamed while Black.

People study King's landmark "I Have A Dream" speech as a masterpiece of public religious discourse. The speech is a powerful melding of the highest aspirations of the nation's ideals with the Judeo-Christian tradition's prophetic conviction of the equal human dignity of all people, without exception.

And yet, today the radical force of this seminal address is often diluted and suppressed. Most know only the final three minutes of this 20-minute speech. Many of us can recall King's hope that his children will one day live in a country where they will be judged by their character not their skin color. But few know the searing critique that preceded his expression of hope. We pass over his denunciation of a nation whose deeds rarely match its professed creeds and whose commitment to justice for Black and poor people is too often tepid, anemic, and half-hearted at best. We forget his scathing criticisms of those who would settle for a false peace that suppresses the terrible realities of inequitable housing, employment, education, and health care.

Our memory of King is selective. Jonathan Eig, in his recent biography of King, observes that people hear of his dream of universal brotherhood but not his call for "fundamental change in the nation's character, not his cry for an end to the triple evils of materialism, militarism, and racism."

In a growing number of places, King's speech and especially his later writings cannot be taught in public schools. His uncompromising critique of the nation's deeply embedded structural racism is rejected as a form of "critical race theory"—which is the label some give to any racial analysis that makes too many white people uncomfortable.

In our Western culture, with our overly rational educational systems, we tend to disparage dreams and visions as being impractical. We dismiss them as idle distractions. But I have long been obsessed with the power of the human imagination, especially the imagination of the despised, disdained, and stigmatized. I am inspired by how, despite all that they have been through and still endure, people dream of new worlds. We persist in the hope that reality not only should—but will—be other than it is. Dreams are what propel people to do risky and dangerous things for the sake of justice.

Anniversaries are times of remembrance and rededication. We must remember King more fully and accurately. He summons us to dare to dream boldly, audaciously, even subversively. For in the face of ongoing wars, xenophobic nationalisms, and anti-Black violence, we don't need less imaginative hope. The need for animating visions, sustaining dreams, and motivating imaginations is more, not less, urgent.

Like King, we must dream of and work for a world animated by true Christian love for all, especially the least among us. As he said in 1967, near the end of his life, "I still have a dream, because, you know, you can't give up in life. . . . I still have a dream that one day justice will roll down like water, and righteousness like a mighty stream. . . . I still have a dream today."
